## Selectmen Meeting

January 12, 2015

UNAPPROVED

The meeting was called to order at 6:30pm.

Present: Robert Allen, Gordy Eastman, Jim Peplau, Calista Brennan, Glen Towne, Jason Rasmussen, Ray Johnson, Gardner Smith, Russell Corbin, Gary Vittum, Curt Allen, Mark Kirko, Becky Basch, Marie Caduto and Katie Savage

Robert started the meeting asking if there were changes to the agenda. There were no changes.

Minutes of the December 8th meeting were approved as printed.

**Treasurer's Report:** As of 12-31/14, Expenses were \$167,185.74; Revenue was \$28,133.63. Balance in Citizen's \$10,980.72, balance in LSB \$808,514.93. Delinquent taxes for 2011-14 are \$121,426.12. Jim moved to approve and Gordy seconded. Report is accepted.

### Action Items:

**Town Plan Adoption:** Jim made a motion to adopt the Town Plan, Gordy seconded, motion passed.

**Reading Fire & Rescue – Windsor Ambulance Presentation:** Windsor Chief Mark Kirko gave a brief presentation about ambulance service to Reading. He stated that there have been a lot of upgrades done since 2009 when Reading last used Windsor services. Chief Kirko left a proposal with the Selectmen.

**Windsor County Sheriff's Department:** Mike Chamberlain gave a brief up-date on patrolling the back roads more and stated that the feedback they have received is positive. The Sheriff's Department would like to see an increase in hours spent in Reading. The rate is \$45 per hour and will be increasing to \$47 at the start of the new fiscal year.

**Becky Basch – Energy Committee:** Becky held a meeting and there was interest expressed in forming a committee. Becky attended a meeting in Fairlee and came away with some good ideas. She will continue to work on these.

**Amsden House & Shed:** The house and shed are have been removed. The landscaping will be finished in the spring.

**Highways:** The loader was in need of a new rear end and should done by the end of the week. The new truck is at Osgood's getting the body. We have more sand ordered as we are running low.

**Liquor License's –** The Selectmen approved Keeper's license.

**Budget for FY 2015-2016:** The Selectmen will meet Saturday AM to finalize.

**Special Articles on Town Meeting Warning:** There was discussion on whether to leave them individually as they are or put all under one article. It was decided to leave them as individual articles.

**Other:** Jason Rasmussen and Marie Caduto spoke about a grant on Flood Resiliency concerning the Mill Brook. They are looking to include Reading with West Windsor and Windsor in a letter of intent to get everything rolling. The selectmen agreed to participate.

Curt Allen asked to have an article put on the Town Meeting Warning for \$75,000 to help purchase a new Fire/Rescue vehicle. The total cost is \$149,000 and the Fire and Rescue Department has raised about half the money. The request was approved by the Selectmen.

On another note it should be mentioned that the Reading Fire Department and the Reading Rescue Squad have merged into one department known as the Reading Fire and Rescue Department under the direction of Chief Vittum.

The Selectboard and Cemetery Commission received a letter and check for \$5,000 from John and Pamela Gerstmayr specifically for the repair and maintenance of Spear Cemetery. On behalf of the Town, the Selectboard wish to extend a sincere thank you to the Gerstmayr's for this gift.

Meeting was adjourned at 7:50pm.

Next Selectboard meeting will be on Monday, February 9, 2015.

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
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

Attendance: School Board - Justin Sluka (Chair) , Shiri Macri (Clerk); School – Zoey Zullo, Libbet Downs; SU – Richard Seaman (finance); Visitors – none.

Call to Order - The meeting was called to order at 6:07p

Approve minutes: Shiri Macri make a motion to approve the minutes of November 19, 2014. Justin Sluka seconds the motion. No discussion. Minutes approved with no changes.

Action/Discussion

Review- Budget 2<sup>nd</sup> draft - Richard Seaman presents draft to board. Draft not yet public re: staffing changes to be discussed in executive session. General review of summary and line items. Zoey and Richard to make changes. Budget workshop meeting to be set.

Executive Session, Title 1, §313, VSA, - Shiri Macri makes a motion to enter into executive session at 7:50pm to discuss personnel changes to the budget. Exited at 7:59p

Action/Discussion

New staff hire: Shiri Macri makes a motion to approve the hiring of Libbet Downs as Administrative Assistant. Justin Sluka seconds the motion. Discussion – Libbet comes to RES highly recommended and a respected member of the community. Libbet has an extensive background in education. The motion is approved unanimously.

Policy Warning: 2<sup>nd</sup> reading- Substitute Teacher Policy D6 – Shiri Macri makes a motion to approve the Substitute Teacher Policy. Justin Sluka seconds the motion. Discussion about pay level as well as education requirements.

The motion is amended. Justin Sluka makes a motion to approve the Substitute Teacher Policy with a change to the last paragraph, first sentence to read "... substitute teachers will be paid per diem wages as determined by the Reading Elementary School Board from year to year." Shiri Macri seconds the motion. No discussion. The motion is approved.

Principal– Zoey submits an informative, detailed report. Discussed classroom walk-through status.

### Librarian's Note

The Reading Public Library will be showing ***Freedom & Unity: The Vermont Movie***, the first-ever documentary series about the state. The six-part film is a collaboration of over four dozen VT filmmakers. Sponsors include the VT Arts Council, VT Humanities Council, and the VT Country Store. Advisors include historians, educators, artists, and authors. The film is thematic, not chronological, exploring themes in the state's history that recur and circle back, from 1777 to the present. Each part is approximately 80 minutes long. They will be shown on **the following Fridays at 7 p.m.**

**February 6** – Part 1: "A Very New Idea" (exploring the Native and Colonial roots from which VT grew).

**February 20** – Part 2: "Under the Surface" (exploring labor wars, eugenics, the McCarthy era, and progressive Republicanism).

**March 6** – Part 3: "Refuge, Reinvention and Revolution" (exploring innovation, interstates, and counter-culture).

**March 20** – Part 4: "Doers and Shapers" (exploring progressivism in education and state law, from Act 250 to civil unions).

**April 3** – Part 5: "Ceres' Children" (exploring participatory democracy and ethics in conservation and farming).

**April 24** – Part 6: "People's Power" (exploring contemporary tensions over energy, independence, climate, and the state's future).

The popcorn and the program are free.

This winter's **book-discussion series** will feature *Remembrance of Things Past*, the multi-volume novel by Marcel Proust. We will be discussing the first volume, *Swann's Way*, on Tuesday, February 17, at 7 p.m. For those who have a Kindle or an iPad with a Kindle app, you can purchase the entire novel for \$2.99 at Amazon. Or you can read it online at [openculture.com](http://openculture.com). I also have one copy of the novel at home; and the library has a Kindle with a copy of the novel on it. I will probably be able to get one copy via interlibrary loan, as well.

### Reading Listers' February Report

#### Tax Preparation time for 2014:

**Homestead Declaration-** Reading parcel owners who have their domicile in Reading are required to file a Vermont Homestead Declaration **annually** on or before April 15.

**Filing State and Federal Income tax extensions-** Individual circumstances may require filing an income tax extension. There are no extensions for the Homestead Declaration. The forms are due on April 15<sup>th</sup> and are considered late if not filed by this date. Late filings are subject to late penalties.

**The Homestead filing information** – It is the criteria for determining income sensitivity eligibility for any residential state-wide educational property tax adjustment.

**Non-residents-** These parcel owners pay the non- resident state-wide education tax only adjusted for the Local CLA.

**Impact of not filing Homestead Declaration-**If you have your domicile in Reading and fail to file a declaration, you are subject to paying any difference between the residential and non-residential education tax plus a substantial penalty.

**Tax preparers-** Remind your tax preparer of the annual Vermont Homestead filing requirement and the date for filing. Forms are available by going on line, and entering Vermont.gov, clicking on VT Tax Department, and clicking on forms.

**The Reading Common Level of Appraisal for 2015 is 99.75.**

Reading Planning Commission Meeting  
January 5, 2015, 7 p.m., Reading Town Offices

Present: Steve Strait, Ken Cox, Kevin Kaija, Becky Basch  
Guests: Jason Rasmussen, Dan Potter, Russ Corbin

Energy Committee – Becky provided an update on the first Energy Committee meeting that was held in November. She said that a few people attended the first meeting. Becky and Jean Goldsborough went to the conference held by the Vermont Climate Action Network (VECAN) in Fairlee in early December and came back with some good ideas for projects that could happen in Reading. Becky will go to the January Selectboard meeting and will ask the Selectboard to appoint her as Energy Coordinator and then the committee will be Ad Hoc depending on projects they decide to undertake. The Energy Committee meets again on January 19<sup>th</sup> at the Library.

Minutes of November 3, 2014 – Ken made a motion to approve as printed, Steve seconded, all were in favor

Town Plan adoption – the Selectboard is having a public hearing on the adoption of the Town Plan on Monday, January 12<sup>th</sup>. Planning Commission members were asked to attend.

Flood resiliency grants – SWCRPC representatives Jason Rasmussen and Dan Potter were present to discuss a grant that is available through the High Meadows Fund for building resilience in Vermont's watersheds. The Ottaquechee Resource Conservation District (ORCD) invited SWCRPC to collaborate on a grant to look at resiliency projects in the Mill Brook Watershed. Jason said that a Phase II geomorphic assessment is being conducted by Fitzgerald Environmental for the Mill Brook watershed and that some project recommendations will come out of that study. The RPC will file a letter of intent with ORCD by Feb 1<sup>st</sup>. Dan Potter explained that potential mitigation projects range from planting trees to buying easements for flood plain storage. The Planning Commission and Selectboard would be part of the discussion as the project develops. Report from Phase II geomorphic assessment will be out in middle of February and will be done by middle of March, and the final grant application is due in April. Jason said that the High Meadows Fund is looking to fund 3 projects statewide. Russ Corbin asked if Fish and Wildlife would be involved. Ken said that Marie Caduto (watershed coordinator) would be involved, and they were looking for representatives from 3 towns. Ken said he would likely be involved through his job at ANR but will not represent the Town as it would be a conflict of interest. Kevin mentioned that the Mill Brook Watershed Association collected data on the Mill Brook several years ago. Jason said they would look at that data to see if it can be used for the current assessment work.

Zoning revisions – Steve brought a list of items that need to be reviewed for the Zoning Bylaw update. Items for review are as follows:

Map – The PC started to modify zoning boundaries to better meet parcel boundaries several years ago. Steve said listers should look at the map to see if the parcel boundaries have changed.

Significant Wildlife Habitat Overlay district – A draft was developed in 2009 and this needs to be finalized. There was some discussion about how the corridor boundaries were developed. Russ Corbin asked how the deer wintering areas are determined as wildlife patterns seem to change according to the forest regeneration. Russ asked if the corridors are necessary for the long term and was concerned that he would not be able to subdivide his land if it were in the overlay district. Russ said he thought that the corridor should be at the highest elevations rather than best building sites. Steve commented that development is not prohibited in the overlay district, but siting may be reviewed so that development is not located in the middle of the corridor. Ken commented that the idea is to create a buffer where wildlife can thrive without being too close to people. Jason said that he could talk to Jens and Forrest Hammond in relation to the Wildlife Habitat Overlay District to get their opinions and to see if they could attend a Planning Commission meeting to discuss the background of the corridor development.

Ridgeline Protection Overlay District – Steve said we should look at it again to determine the ridgelines that should be included. Jason said that they have software to do viewshed analysis from a number of vantage points to assist in determining which ridgelines can be seen from a number of different locations. They used this software for a viewshed analysis in Ludlow. Steve will look at the contour maps as well.

Driveway setbacks – Bob Allen asked about driveway setback requirements, and the SB determined that driveways should be 25 ft from property boundaries. Steve said he thought that the change should be included in the Zoning changes.

Housing – Setback requirements should waive setbacks for accessibility ramps.

Forest Fragmentation Project recommendations - Steve said Forest Fragmentation Project included technical review of town plan and zoning in App E. Steve handed out the pages of the document that included recommended changes to the zoning bylaws. Jason said that they have some grant funding through Dept of Forests, Parks and Recreation forest stewardship project that can be used to assist with zoning changes related to forest stewardship. Dan said that there is a deadline at the end of March so they will need to provide this assistance in the near future. Becky asked if the RPC has the most recent copy of the Zoning Bylaws. Jason said that the most recent document they have is dated March 2009, and Forest Overlay District map is dated April 2009. Jason said the RPC would look at the maps and would follow up with John Fike to make sure that the parcel boundaries are up to date. Steve asked PC members to review the recommendations in the Forest Fragmentation Study, and asked that Jason bring a hard copy to PC meetings.

Keven made a motion to adjourn, Ken seconded, meeting adjourned at 8:30 pm
